A Challenge from Reb Zalman Schachter-Shalomi

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Reb Zalman Schachter-Shalomi, born in Poland in 1924, arrived in New York in 1941 when his family fled Nazi Europe. He studied in New York and was ordained by the Lubavich Hassidic yeshiva. As he pursued his studies in psychology, religion and spirituality, he broke away from Lubavich and ultimately became the father of the Jewish Renewal movement. He is one of the most unusual figures in contemporary religious life. Although he could not be described as a centrist Orthodox Jew, he has maintained an ongoing dialogue with Rabbi Marc Angel, Director of the Institute for Jewish Ideas and Ideals. During one of their recent conversations, Rabbi Angel invited Reb Zalman to share his thoughts and concerns about the spiritual life of modern Orthodoxy.
